If you have been sexually assaulted, it is your right:

- To talk to police.
- To not talk to police.
- To get support.
- To get medical care.
- To be treated with respect.
- To be safe.
- To change your mind at any time.





What is an Online Sexual Assault Report?

If you have been sexually assaulted and want to report but you are not ready to talk to police, you can give them information online.



An **online Sexual Assault Report** is a complaint form to tell police a sexual assault happened to you.



It is a first step in reporting sexual assault, so police can begin an **investigation**.





An **investigation** is when police look for **evidence**.



Evidence is information that shows that a crime has happened.



You can also make a **Sexual**Assault Report by calling
Policelink.

You can make a **Sexual Assault Report** by going to your local police station.



It is best to make a plan and give time for you and police to be ready before you do this.



Making a Sexual Assault Report with Policelink or in an Online Sexual Assault Report is a good first step.





How to make an Online


Sexual Assault Report?

To make an online report you need to use the internet.



You can ask for help from a person you trust.

You must be an adult to report sexual assault online.



You might need to do something to help you feel calm and relaxed before you begin.

Read the information and Privacy Statement on the **Reporting a Sexual Assault** webpage before making your report.



The information and Privacy Statement is not Easy Read.



You can ask someone you trust to help you understand the information.



When you are ready to begin, click the **report sexual assault now** button at the bottom of the webpage to open the form.



The online reporting form will ask

for personal information like:



• Your name

- Your address
- Your phone number

The form will also ask you to share:

• What happened.



Information about the person

who hurt you.





Your answers will give police the information they need to help you.



When you have finished the form, you will be given a Queensland Police report number.



It will start with QP.

Make sure you keep this number safe.



A police officer will contact you as soon as they can to talk about what could happen next.






They might ask you to make a time to give a **statement** to police.



A statement is made in an interview with police where you give details of who, what, when and where the sexual assault happened.
